LETTER FROM FR. ALDO

As a Church we have recently lived through amazing and changing times with the announcement that Pope Benedict XVI would resign on 28th February.

His reason for doing so was clearly stated "I am well aware that this ministry, due to its essential spiritual nature, must be carried out not only with words and deeds, but no less with prayer and suffering. However, in today's world, subject to so many rapid changes and shaken by questions of deep relevance for the life of faith, in order to govern the bark of Saint Peter and proclaim the Gospel, both strength of mind and body are necessary, strength which in the last few months, has deteriorated in me to the extent that I have had to recognise my incapacity to adequately fulfil the ministry entrusted to me."

Such was the humility and honesty of the man and one could not adversely comment on the decision that he had come to but who would be the one who would fill the Shoes of the Fisherman? There was no obvious answer to that question.

Shortly after, a rather swift Conclave, did Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio the Archbishop of Buenos Aires, a 'consummate outsider' assume the office and was presented to us as Pope Francis. We were reminded that he was the first non-European to be elected for many centuries and that he was the first Jesuit to ever have been elected Pope but obviously the Cardinals saw that he was the one to occupy the Chair of Peter for it has been said that they were looking for a Pope who "must be a man who, from the contemplation and adoration of Jesus Christ, helps the church to go out to the existential peripheries, that helps her to be the fruitful mother, who gains life from the sweet and comforting joy of evangelizing". These qualities do not imply criticism of the Pope–Emeritus or Blessed John Paul II but signify that there was to be a different approach in the new Papacy and as we have already seen this is becoming increasingly apparent.

Pope Francis is not a polyglot, nor is he a theologian, philosopher or an academic as were his immediate predecessors and, it is being said, the likelihood of him writing an encyclical is remote but his vast pastoral experience is such as to make him the one who is to faithfully shepherd the Flock of Christ in the difficult future that lies ahead of us all and so we must listen and learn from him as he leads us on our pilgrim way and pray for him daily.

LENT REFLECTION GROUP "BE RECONCILLED TO GOD"

This year, seven people took part in our Lent reflection group. We met for five weeks during Lent to pray, discuss and reflect on the Sunday readings for the five Sundays from the second Sunday of Lent through to Palm Sunday.

We used as our guide a series of reflections based on the subject of reconcilliation. This took extracts from the catechism on confession. combined with reflections on the Lenten Sunday Mass readings to guide the reflections and discussions. Some weeks we followed this closely, other weeks our discussions were more wide ranging picking up on different aspects of the Sunday gospel. Sometimes it was quiet reflection, sometimes it was more animated. However it went, there was always something unexpected to take away. The Gospel readings are well known but often a new insight or new way of understanding them would come out of the discussions. I was surprised at how beautiful and wise the extracts from the catechism could be.

The Lent reflection group fits in to our annual journey through Lent. Like travellers at the beginning of a journey, the first meeting of the group is a bit tentative as we find our way, but over the five weeks of Lent we become more relaxed, more open and more willing to share our thoughts and reflections. Personally I find that coming together in this journey of discovery helps develop my faith.

FAIRTRADE STALL

Our stall reopens on Sunday 28 April 2013

St Teresa's is one of five churches in Charlbury to actively support the FAIRTRADE movement. Launched in Sept 2010, our stall makes a selection of the TRAIDCRAFT /Fairtrade product line available - mostly food but also fashion and gift items from around the world.

TRAIDCRAFT was established as a Christian response to poverty, working with people of all faiths and none. As a dedicated fair trade company, they buy from disadvantaged producers, and as a charity they help producers to engage in trade and campaign for trade justice.

Their vision is A WORLD FREED FROM THE SCANDAL OF POVERTY.

Our parish's contribution is to sell/buy these goods at cost on a weekly basis. There is a stall outside St Teresa's after the 11 am Mass on Sundays when the weather is fair. The catalogue is also available for orders from those who attend St Kenelm's. These orders can be taken any time.

St Teresa's belong to the Charlbury Fairtraders group and we pool our weekly orders to save on delivery charges and minimise costs.

Thank you to all parishioners for supporting our mission of fighting poverty through trade.

servers over the age of 18 all have had to be CRB (now DBS) checked, and that the parish is now compliant and the process not too arduous. Louise is now stepping down as a safeguarding representative, and she was thanked for the nearly 10 years work she has done.

Paul Radcliffe gave a detailed account of the financial situation in the parish. He pointed out that collections have remained at about the same level as last year. Covenanted income has remained static since 2006, whilst non-covenanted collection income has fluctuated with the economic climate. The importance to the parish of people gift aiding their contributions was discussed – last year reclaimed tax contributed 5½ thousand pounds to the parish income. This was a substantial portion of the total income. Paul explained how a significant percent of the parish income goes to the diocese, and that the parish also has to fund the ongoing maintenance at St.Teresa's Church and Presbytery expenses including maintenance, fuel, food, council tax etc. It has been suggested that the financial issues should be explained one Sunday to give people a better understanding of what is required.

There were reports on forthcoming events - all of which are covered elsewhere in this magazine - then the meeting went on to discuss the practicalities of providing tea and coffee after Mass at St Teresa's and St.Kenelm's, and whether there was any way it could be done at St Teresa's in bad weather. There was a discussion of the possibility of converting the store outside St. Teresa's into a parish room - it has been looked at and is prohibitively expensive. Anne Clifton pointed out that the monthly newsletter used to include a long list of villages in the parish (Charlbury, Combe, Duns Tew, Enstone, Gagingwell, Glympton, Middle Barton, Radford, Ramsden, Steeple Aston and Stonesfield), and made a plea for ideas to improve communication with people in the outlying areas. There was a long discussion about the acoustics in St.Teresa's, and the fact that people at the back of the church find it hard to hear what is being said during Mass, and a related discussion on the pros and cons of Mass sheets. It was decided that the possibility of installing speakers should be investigated. Finally there was a brief discussion on outreach.

MAGNIFICAT: DAILY MASS READINGS AND MUCH MORE

MAGNIFICAT is a pocket sized monthly publication by The Catholic Herald which provides all readings, psalms and prayers for every day of the year - Matins, Mass and Vespers. It also carries a wealth of other spiritual reading and daily reflections by inspirational theologians and writers from all ages. The UK edition is edited by former parishioners Leonie and Stratford Caldecott, who many of you will remember warmly.

Since its inception in September 2010, it has proven an excellent way to enter fully into the Church's liturgical rhythms and spiritual legacy, especially during Holy Week. It has also made the transition into the new liturgical form a more manageable and comprehensible experience.

As an "ambassador" for this publication, I have been given 20 free copies of April's issue, to distribute as I see fit amongst parishioners likely to be interested in enjoying the booklet and seeing its uses, as part of daily devotion as well as preparation for Sunday's liturgy.

Should you be interested in trialing this publication please let me know. I hope to have one or two spare copies for the next few months. The current rate is £38 per year - a £10 saving on the cover cost. For this you will receive 12 monthly copies and a special issue for Holy Week.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING: 25th APRIL 2013

On Thursday 24th April 2013, around 20 members of the parish attended the Annual Parish Meeting in St.Teresa's Church. The meeting had an open agenda and many different issues were raised. Official minutes of the meeting were taken and will be available later, this is just a brief and unofficial report to give you an overview of some of the things that were discussed.

The meeting started by appointing a chair person, both for the meeting and as chair of the Pastoral Council. There was only one nomination – Madeleine Wheare, and she was duly appointed.

Louise Littledale and Sharnalee Foster gave a report on safeguarding in St.Teresa's and answered questions arising. Louise explained how people involved in Children's Liturgy, catechists, eucharistic ministers and altar

A CALL TO ACTION

Last June I read a letter in The Tablet from seven priests in the Portsmouth Diocese who expressed their concern about stagnation and decline in the Church, under the heading 'A Call To Action'. They feel – like many of us – that the decline in the number of Catholics has reached alarming proportions and something needs to be done about it.

There was a meeting after the letter's publication which I went to last October in London, attended by over 400 mainly lay people. Since then there has been slow but steady progress in discussing ways of meeting this challenge of decline, and you can visit the ACTA website since created at www.acalltoaction.org.uk to read about it.

I feel I need to reassure you about discussing governance, people and even doctrine in the Church. We parishioners come from a background of defending our beliefs from people of other faiths and none, so our first instinct can be to withdraw from engaging with problems – we'll get by with God's help, and the bishops and hierarchy will provide leadership. So I feel that the first reassurance I need to give you is that *no-one is proposing a new Church without bishops* - the people of ACTA take as a starting point that there is no way of achieving change *without* the leadership of the bishops. But for a next step, they all know that it is very difficult to get a conversation going with the bishops to achieve change. Surely that has been our experience - you cannot make changes unless you can talk without anxiety about how things might be differently arranged. You can talk to the bishops forever, but if they won't entertain any solutions we put forward it is a waste of time.

A second reassurance I want to give you is not quite so strong, but still relevant. It is that not only are the members of ACTA practising Catholics, but their average age is well over sixty. Reassurance? - by the time we all get going on the Church's problems, we may well all be dead! Well, just to say these are not wild young men and women, but (in some ways very) conservative, older individuals, many of them shying away from confrontation. The good side of that is that they are not going to be rude to you, they are not going to run off in a huff if you or the bishops snub them, and they don't for a second accept that they are 'weirdoes' because they think that some things could be and should be changed in the Church.

We and they have been driven into a corner where we ask ourselves "Who else will put this right if we don't try to do it ourselves?"

What are the ideas and issues worth discussing? The most favoured is probably that mandatory celibacy for priests should end, as a step towards recruiting more of the priests we so badly need. Beyond that there is a wide spectrum of ideas and unrealised visions of Vatican II, and these are discussed in a robust way in an ACTA forum online. Robust means finger-wagging and finger-pointing are avoided by most people, but no one gets too uptight if the tone gets a bit shrill from time to time. You can't discuss everything as if you were at a philosophy seminar, after all.

Are things any better than they were a year ago? There was no forum for concerned Catholics at that time; contact with loyal concerned Catholics in the USA and Australia with the same concerns was minimal; and any change at the level of the Pope seemed unlikely for years to come. The recent arrival of a new Pope has stirred hope for change among many Catholics.

I will report on the Oxfordshire ACTA meeting later in the year. Let me conclude by telling you what I want for my children's children in the Church – to be able to go to weekly Mass without setting out on a journey of more than twenty-five minutes, to be able to attend Catholic schools, to be able to live according to Christ's preaching of love for others, and to be easy about their relationships with other Christians and all other people. None of these things will be achieved without change.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN CHARLBURY - CTC

Hilda J J and Clare C are St Teresa's CTC representatives.

Madeleine Wheare who served on the committee for three years has stepped down. The Committee meets every two months to discuss and coordinate activities as well as to support each other. The Chairmanship rotates around the churches - the current Chair is Liz Tait of St Mary's. There are many events which happen in Charlbury organised by CTC.

UNITED SERVICES: There are three United Services a year, in January for Christian Unity, in May for Christian Aid and in October for One World Week and they are hosted in rotation between the five denominations. United Services are usually held at 9.45 am in St Mary's Church. This is convenient as the Catholics and Quakers can still attend their own services. As a rule only two or three people from St Teresa's attend - sadly, we are under represented. It would be good to work together and share worship with our fellow Christians.

St Teresa's turn to organise a service will arise in January 2014 - the service for CHRISTIAN UNITY. Our service is normally held in St Teresa's Church at 3 pm on that Sunday and a modified form of liturgy is used. It is always well attended by other denominations.

LENT LUNCHES: The series of **Lent lunches** was very successful with all churches taking part on a rota system. St Teresa's turn was ably supported by parishioners, providing home made soups, setting up and serving on the day. I overheard someone from another church say: "St Teresa's make the best soups!"

LENT TALKS: The theme of this year's Lenten series was 'Five pathways: exploring Christian tradition in Charlbury'. We had another impressive group of speakers including our very own Dr Judith Champ, a lecturer in Church History from St Mary's College Oscott. The SPRING MEETING of CTC was held on 17 April and the special speaker was Dr Mick Donegan, founder and CEO of "SPECIAL EFFECT" a charity for the disabled. This charity is especially attractive to young donors and fund raisers as its main aim is to give everyone the opportunity to play computer games, regardless of any disability. They say "We'll do whatever it takes, because we've seen first-hand what a kick-start effect games can have on rehabilitation, inclusion and quality of life."

CHRISTIAN AID LUNCH Friday 17 May Baptist Church 12 - 2 pm All churches take it in turns to organise this event in May as part of Christian Aid week. This year it is the Baptists' turn. They will organise the menu and all five churches will take part in preparing the food. This lunch is open to the wider community and is usually a lavish meal well attended by all. Donations to Christian Aid.

CHURCH FRIENDS

This initiative welcomes new people to Charlbury with a welcome pack explaining where all the nearest shops can be found. It also contains an information map of the town and details of organisations and churches. There are 53 people listed as Church Friends throughout Charlbury but this still does not cover the whole of the town.
